The quiet time to reflect and plan for the day is a favorite time for me. This was only interrupted by two Common Mergansers flying up and down the river wondering what happened to their quiet, peaceful river.

My son, Tom, took Jared downstream a bit to help him get started. Sidney was with me, and our start was marred by snags and retying leaders and hooks.

Within minutes it sounded like a bull moose running through thick timber. Tom emerged and grabbed the landing

net. Jared had hooked a nice steelhead on his second cast. We all joined the fun and watched him catch his first trout, a nice silver 27 incher yet to spawn. Not a bad way to start trout fishing.

An ample number of pictures were taken before releasing the fish. Some of us shared our horror stories of how long it took to catch their first steelhead. I won that contest hands down, taking seven years. My dad was not a steelhead fisherman, and we learned the art by trial and error. Mostly on the error side.

Sidney and I returned to our spot, locating a few more snags before finding fishable drifts. We switched from spawn and yarn to brown nymph flies. She was quickly into two steelhead followed by a nice native brown. The day could not

> have been going any better. Anything else would just be frosting on the cake. After some fast action in the first hours. things quieted down and the grind of a long day of fishing started.

Brule River Sportsmen's Club Electronic Meeting Minutes April 22, 2024



President Dennis Pratt called the meeting to order at 6:02 p.m. at KroBar.

Officers and Directors: Present - Ed Chaplinski, Paul Helbach, Glen Hill, Courtney Johnson, Mick Killoren, Ken Lundberg, Dennis Pratt, Mike Sierszen, Den Smet, Jeff Stollenwerk, Walt Swanson, Jim Waletzko, Dean Wellman, and Mike Zicus.

Minutes of the March Meeting: The minutes as written in the April newsletter were approved following a motion by Dean Wellman, second by Ken Lundberg and unanimous approval by voice vote.

Treasurer's and Financial Secretary's Reports: Treasurer Jeff Stollenwerk reported that March's beginning balance was \$9,232.99, and the ending balance was \$10,226.91 with the following expenses: Pro Print (February newsletter) \$30.16; Katie Thompson (March newsletter) \$200; Pro Print (business cards) \$80.92; Pro Print (March newsletter) \$96.60; Transfer to Savings (February donations) \$90; WI Dept of Admin (raffle license) \$25. The Treasurer's report was approved following a motion by Walt Swanson, second by Courtney Johnson, and unanimous approval by voice vote. President Dennis Pratt reported for Financial Secretary Dean Wellman that there were \$736 in total deposits into the general fund since the last meeting and that the Club had two new members and 21 renewals. The Financial Secretary's report was approved following a motion by Dean Wellman, a second by Ken Lundberg, and unanimous approval by voice vote.

Committee Reports

<u>Legislative</u>: Ken Lundberg – Governor Evers line item vetoed a few things. The Wisconsin Wildlife Federation is working to stop commercial lake trout fishing on Lake Michigan. Wake boats are coming under scrutiny for causing damage to lake shores and lake bottoms. Legislation is being drafted. The herbicide 2,4-D used for selective broadleaf weed control may be considered for restricted use near water sources.

<u>Habitat</u>: Dennis Pratt – Our first volunteer workday, planting tamarack/spruce at Beaupre project site (Palmer's Landing) will be held on May 18. No other habitat projects have been finalized yet.

<u>Audit</u>: Jeff Stollenwerk – Budget committee meetings were held by email. Three major items were mentioned: The Club continues to be in good financial shape; the online store has shown continued growth; Investment CDs have ~5% returns. The budget report was approved following a motion by Mike Sierszen and a second by Mike Zicus.

Education: Den Smet – Den and Dennis made presentations to >200 students at Superior High School and Northwestern.

Comments were made about the positive reactions from the younger students receiving the new Club stickers. Carey Edwards has been taking care of the newly added Hayward and Washburn aquariums.

<u>Scholarship</u>: Mike Sierszen/Paul Helbach – Three applications received for college so far, expecting more soon. No word from Northwestern High School yet.

<u>Membership</u>: Jim Waletzko/Ed Chaplinski – All extra newsletters handed out. Ed mentioned visiting with two new prospective members.

<u>Social Media</u>: Mike Zicus/Dennis Pratt – Not a lot going on. Articles needed for the newsletter. Ken will do one regarding the steelhead opener.

Other Business

<u>Spring Clean-up Date</u>: Smet - This year's spring cleanup will be held on April 27 (backup date May 11). Den Smet made a motion to cover food costs, with a second by Ed Chaplinski and unanimous approval by voice vote.

<u>Family Fun Day:</u> Attendees were asked to think about volunteering before the next meeting. We'll cover this item in next month's meeting.

<u>Lake Superior Trollers Veteran Event Support:</u> Mick Killoren made a motion to donate \$500 and a second by Paul Helbach and unanimous approval by voice vote.

Fly of the Month: Pass Lake by Walt.

<u>Spring Raffle Items:</u> Mike Sierszen – 300 tickets will be sold over four months. Drawing during the August meeting. Tickets coming soon.

Fly of the Month Book: The fly book is very popular. We've sold 31 thus far and have another 11 are spoken for.

The Pass Lake Special

As I understand the story, the Pass Lake was

invented by a Lutheran minister named Stubenvoll from Clintonville, WI in the 1930s. Originally it was tied with a mallard flank feather tail, black chenille body, brown hackle and white calf tail wing. I've seen it tied as a wet fly or as a dry fly. Folks tie it in all sorts of ways. Different materials, colors and hooks in sizes from 8 to 16 are common. This is a great fly for beginners. If the presentation is good, you will catch fish.
